



# Cambodia 1 megawatt solar system cost

How much does solar energy cost in Cambodia?

One of the promising traits of solar energy in Cambodia is its cost. The average electricity price for solar power is around USD 0.03 per kW, significantly lower than that of coal, which is USD 7.7 per kW.

Does Cambodia have solar power?

Solar power capacity has been on a sharp ascent in Cambodia recently, increasing at a 10% annual rate from less than 1% of national generation capacity, however. Some 400-MW of solar-fueled power capacity is now connected to the national grid, according to the Department of Mines and Energy.

Will solar power be a key part of Cambodia's Power Development Plan?

The country recently approved the Power Development Masterplan (2021-2040), covering an inspiring goal of increasing solar PV capacity to 1,000 MW by 2030 and 3,000 MW by 2040. Solar generation will need to be a key part of Cambodia's efforts to expand access to affordable power while also transitioning to cleaner energy.

What percentage of Cambodia's energy mix is solar?

Overall, solar accounted for 6.36% of Cambodia's energy mix in 2021, according to data from the EDC. The country's total installed capacity totaled 376.8 MW in 2021. In 2020, there were 296.80 MW of solar installed, representing 3.38% of the energy mix.

Can large-scale solar PV be developed in Cambodia?

It is regarded as a convincing example demonstrating the potential to develop cost-effective large-scale solar PV in Cambodia by uniting the public and private sectors. Phase II of the solar park, which totals 40 MW, was tendered in 2020 and awarded to Trina Solar with another record-low price of \$0.026 per kWh.

Does Cambodia have a National Solar Park?

A 100-megawatt (MW) National Solar Park, a partnership between the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and Electricite du Cambodge (EDC), Cambodia's national power utility, have connected to the national grid.

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Twenty-six bidders submitted proposals to develop a 60 megawatt (MW) solar power project to state-owned Electricite du Cambodge (EDC) in September. The average bid price set a record low for Southeast Asia, which should persuade neighboring governments to embrace auctions, according to the Asian Development Bank (ADB).

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Phase I of the tender, for the first 60 MW, was organised in 2019 and awarded to the firm Prime Road Alternative. The process resulted in a record-low price for utility-scale, grid-connected solar PV in Southeast Asia, at US\$0.039 per kilowatt-hours (kWh). The remaining 40 MW was tendered in 2020 and awarded to Trina Solar Co., Ltd.

Cambodia's grid-scale solar development started with just a 10 MW pilot in 2017. Today, nine solar power plants are connected to the national grid and are capable of producing up to 444 megawatts (MW), according to the Stimson Center's Mekong Infrastructure Tracker. That tracker also reveals 620 MW of capacity is on the way from two solar ...

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Cambodia's first utility-scale solar PV project reached financial close in May 2017, a 10 MW farm in Bavet City, Svay Rieng Prov-ince. Since August 2019, a solar park in Kampong Speu with a total capacity of 60 MW is online. In 2019, a 60 MW solar farm tender resulted in a price of 3,877 USD /kWh which is cheaper than any
